Question: What strategies do you use at the beginning of the school year to get to know your students, both personally and academically?

Winning Answer:

"I have my students write themselves a letter at the beginning of the year detailing their hopes, goals, and fears for fifth grade. They tell me their deepest fears and what they hope to accomplish in fifth grade. I save the letters and give them back to my students on the last day of school. They love looking at how their handwriting and spelling has changed and the things they wrote about. I also have their parents write me a letter telling me about their student since no one knows a student more than their parent. Their letters are very insightful!"

"I have used a great tool called Blobs and Lines in my elementary classroom the past two years. I got this from the Cult of Pedagogy blog. Each question helps classrooms get to know one another better, and most importantly shows students we have much more in common with one another than what makes us different. Questions from the 'blob' are like, find people who like the same type of music as you or have the same favorite color. The kids have to group up and it is awesome to see the looks on their faces when the realize how many kids are like them! Statements from the 'lines' part has students line up in some time of order, i.e., by birthday, height, number of siblings, etc. It is a great way to get conversation started and see the organizational and social skills of the group!"

Instructional Advocacy July Spotlight

Leigh Bellville, an Iowa Core Advocate, told us about her instructional advocacy presenting at a conference. Leigh said, "I presented as a keynote during a Secondary Literacy Symposium in Sioux City, IA. The keynote focused on 'Equity in Today's Classrooms' and the breakout session was entitled 'Shifting from Theory to Practice.' The sessions allowed attendees to acquire resources from achievethecore.org designed to empower teachers to provide equitable standards-aligned educational opportunities for all students. The standards strategically allow students to build skills to ensure college and career readiness. Attendees were asked to consider the following question: What is our responsibility as educators in relation to the Shifts of the Common Core? Student interviews were included by graduates of Indianola Community School District who shared the importance of creating opportunities for all students to access complex text and their shared belief that all students can read grade level text and should be provided challenges to ensure growth. The breakout session following the keynote provided an opportunity to continue the conversation regarding the three Shifts of ELA/Literacy. The Shifts provide a frame that describes how these standards raise expectations across multiple areas of students' educational experience including instructional materials, classroom practice, and assessment. Attendees explored a common text through the lens of each of the three Shifts. Attendees engaged with tools to implement these Shifts,

while also viewing samples of lowa educators testing those resources in the field. Resources were shared to assist in selecting quality texts and tools to support our students." We are super excited to hear about the instructional advocacy work you are doing in lowa, Leigh!
